The #88 car will be driven by elite Porsche Racing Team, FarnbacherLoles (www.farnbacherloles.com) and signifies the Foundation's dedication to drive research forward. An all-star team made up of Craig Stanton, Bryce Miller, Jan Charouz, Justin Jackson and Tom Pank will drive the car in the race that is known as a true test of endurance and teamwork.

The program allows for people of all ages to get involved and support the cause.
